## BEALS HERITAGE CENTER PHASE III

Beals Historical Society is currently on a mission to build a cold-storage building by spring if funding allows. The building will be used to house its two lobster-fishing boats plus any item that does not require a certain temperature to maintain it. After receiving a \$15,000 grant from the Davis Family Foundation, the groundwork and 36' x 40' cement slab were completed at a cost of \$9,410. Originally, BHS intended to build a pavilion eventually adding walls to the structure; however, due to the size of the boats, it is necessary to add the walls for roof support. This structure will also be used to hold events and programs throughout the summer, as the school gym is unavailable during this time. The following is a brief history of the boats.

According to research, well-known builder Maurice Dow built BHS's oldest treasure in 1902 for a Beals Island fisherman Lowell Beal. The boat is the only one of its kind known to exist. In that era of boat building, there was an evolution occurring in lobster boat design, combined with the introduction of the internal combustion engine. The era of oar-powered lobster boats, such as rowboats, dories, pea pods, and sail

powered boats, including the Friendship sloop, was giving way to boats of a different design, or boats that could be rowed, sailed, or power driven, called "reach boats".

The reach boat hull was somewhat of a schooner design, with a rounded stem and a slanted schooner-type transom stern, and rounded bilge. Reach boats could have been of different dimensions, but possibly a length of 20-25 feet would have been typical. It is possible that the Dow boat would have been referred to as a reach boat.

It is intended that the Dow boat will be displayed along with BHS's Harold Gower Jonesport Model (square stern and other characteristic design features) originally built for a Beals fisherman Kenneth Beal. BHS has a copy of the expense record of all boats (including the Kenneth Beal boat) built by Harold Gower. The provenance for this lobster boat includes all owners since its launching. Besides the boat, expense record, and provenance, the Heritage Center also displays a 19-page set of 16" x 20" posters depicting and describing Harold Gower building a cedar-planked boat. Fortunately, BHS has a wonderful

wooden boatbuilding collection, which includes the final product. Time and weather have taken a heavy toll on these unique boats, so it is imperative to move this project along as quickly as possible.

Phase III will allow people the opportunity to view the progression of the lobster boat, as they step back in time from one of the earliest local boat builders to one of more recent years.

The success of Phase III will depend on availability of funds. It is estimated that another \$15,000 is needed to complete the project. 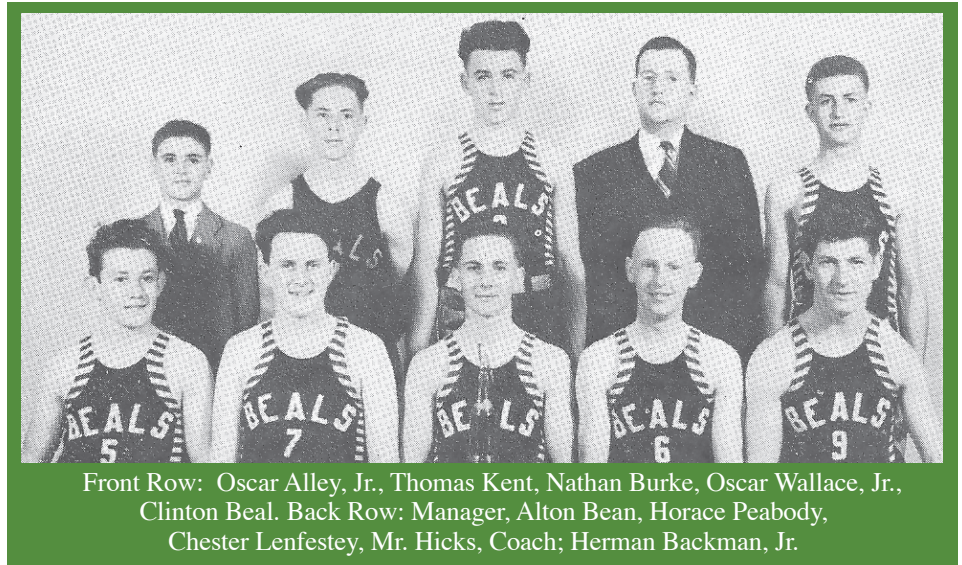

# 1941 BEALS HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL TEAM

This information is taken from the "Athletics" section of the 1941 Beals High School Ocean Breeze yearbook. Athletic Editor was Herman Backman, Jr and Assistant Athletic Editor was Chester E. Lenfestey.

Shooting their way to the championship of the league and the consolation game of the tournament, the "Green Hornets" of Beals High boast of one of the best records in basketball for the season of 1940-1941.

The call for candidates brought forth Nathan Burke, Oscar B. Wallace, Jr., and Thomas Kent, seniors; Herman Backman, Jr., Clinton Beal, and Oscar Alley, Jr., juniors; Chester Lenfestey, sophomore; Horace Peabody and Alton Bean, freshman; a veteran team that had won the West Washington County Tournament held in Jonesport and second place in the league for the year 1939 - 1940.

Under the efficient coaching of their principal, Charles Hicks, the boys worked faithfully and started clicking at the start. Winning seventeen games out of twenty-one, they scored 788 points to their opponents 549.

*Note from BHS Editor:* The Green Hornets practiced against Addison, Washington State Normal School and

Harrington. Their "league" games were held with Jonesboro, Milbridge, Jonesport, Harrington, Columbia Falls, Cherryfield, and Addison. The "tournament" was played between Milbridge, Cherryfield and Jonesport with Cherryfield being the winner and Beals the runner up. The score was 48 - 31.
